### **ANNUAL CONCERT & PRIZE GIVING**

Many congratulations to Chard School on a marvellous concert coupled with the annual Prize Giving before a packed audience of parents and friends at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Furnham Road, Chard on Friday 7th July 2023. This is very much the high point of the school year as the children come together to show case their musical talents. The OCA was represented as always by the association's President and Chairman.

It is fitting for OCs to be present on this special occasion as many of the prizes bear the names of former pupils as well as three former Headmasters. Many of the names date back several decades to the 1930s. Of particular interest is the J.R.Long Efficiency Cup, perhaps the oldest and smallest of all the vast array of cups on display. Mr. Long was a master at the school and retired just before the outbreak of WW2. After the war the cup was invariably awarded to the Head Prefect. On one occasion, just a few years ago, the recipient of the cup in 1953 happened to be present at Prize Giving and was able to say 'hello' to his successor holder of this treasured prize. In her annual presentation Katie Hill, Head Teacher announced that the Lawrence Powell Music Scholarship and the Old Cerdics Academic Scholarship were awarded to Thomas Burmistrovas and Amelie Talbot respectively. It was the time of year when the OCA welcomes the leavers to their ranks as they go on to secondary education. The now traditional presentation by the OCA of 'Three Centuries of History', the comprehensive history of Chard School (see later) was presented to them by OC David Bryant on behalf of the association. All in all a wonderful way to end yet another academic year shared by the whole school community and the opportunity to wish the Upper Cerdic children good luck as they come








### CHARD SCHOOL: THREE CENTURIES OF HISTORY/ MOON LANDING 1969

#### CHARD SCHOOL – Three Centuries of History



This comprehensive account of the three hundred years history of one of the oldest schools in Somerset, sponsored by the Old Cerdics Association, was written and researched

Banner headline from the Chard & Ilminster News July 2023. With all the children on holiday and away from school; all quiet and no happy chatty children on site what better time to carry out refurbishment work at Chard School? However, hidden away amidst some plumbing by the eminent author and Old Cerdic Derrick Warren who spent his working life as a cartographic surveyor with the Ordnance Survey.

First published amidst wide acclaim and media interest at the school's Summer Fair in 2007 the story goes back to the very beginning in 1671 when William Symes gave his Manor House in Chard to the Portreeve and Burgesses of the Borough 'for the education and bringing up of youth in virtue and learning'.

A second edition bringing the history right up to date, including some of the most difficult years in the school's long history brought about by the global pandemic was published in 2021 and is still available to purchase from the school at £18.00 to include p&p. work the Facilities Manager, Jon Henville, unearthed a remarkable discovery - an original copy of The Times Saturday Review dated 19th July 1969 featuring a report on the schedule of events leading up to the historic Moon Landing of that year. The Chard & Ilminster News seized upon the story and proceeded with a detailed history of the school - 'a place steeped in rich history boasts three centuries of captivating stories'.

Is there an Old Cerdic out there, or perhaps a former Master, who would like his newspaper back? No longer in pristine condition given its age but just about legible none the less including the following excerpt - 'Before Neil Armstrong opens the hatch of his lunar vehicle at about seven o'clock on Monday morning the two astronauts will put on their space suits' One wonders whether there may be other 'captivating' long-lost papers secreted somewhere in the school's dusty corners!?
